Positioning for Application and Success

Successful organizations have the following:	
	A history of successful collaboration with other entities and groups
	□ local foundations, other agencies, other stakeholders
	□ corporate philanthropy programs
	Capacity and structure
	□ right staff with right qualifications (board structure, legal structure, exemption, etc.)
	■ knowledge of industry/sector
	□ Adequate technological resources or alliances
	Focused on objective measurement of community impact
	☐ Can you quantify the social return on investment
	☐ Use of logic models to design and evaluate the programs
	A proposed program that reflects nationally recognized best practices
	☐ Aligned with national best practices recognized in the literature and funding sources

Positioning for Application and Success (cont.)

☐ A need supported by current relevant data from credible sources Sufficient statistical evidence to support proposed solution Updated data – from national and local databases Maintain balance between reason and emotion Credible evaluation plan or external evaluator Evaluation plan – short term – mid term – long term Do you have outcomes measurement strategy? Relevant collaborations Backed-up in writing Understanding memoranda – letters of support

Where Should Small Nonprofits Look for Grants?

Know Your Organization If your Organization has never applied for a grant or Does not have a large number of Donors LOCAL FUNDING is the BEST WAY to START building CREDIBILITY Wining Foundation's funding requires excellent relationships If your Organization are eligible for a Federal Grant, there is no reason not to apply. Many foundations tend to fund locally Small and New NPO can get grants if all eligibility requirements are satisfied **Search for Funding** Internet databases **News Papers Annual Reports** Government sites

Grant Writing Myths Busted

- I. Writing a Grant is an instant solution to our Money Problems
 - Rarely the first grant seekers get funded
- II. Grants aren't like other fundraising ...it's a different "animal" altogether
 - If you get rejected find out WHY and how can you do better next time
- III. The economic climate caused foundations to cut back on funding so why apply?
 - It may take 1 to 2 years before your efforts pay off (They usually meet once a year)
- IV. Foundations do not provide for operational support
 - A shift has occurred a bit more from programmatic funding to operational funding
- V. We don't know how to search for funders and databases are expensive
 - Use a public library / there are FREE databases
- VI. Writing a grant proposal is complicated
 - Make sure you follow the Guidelines
- VII. We do not have a proposal writer and they are expensive
 - Look for someone who can learn or for a volunteer! After all we are NPOs
